



Agenda: Regulation and Control of Semi-Automatic Weapons in the Middle East for Enhanced Regional Security

Day 1: The session opened with a roll call (quorum: 57), followed by a General Speakers List (GSL). A moderated session discussed the causes and impact of arms trade in the Middle East, lasting 25 minutes. After returning to the GSL, delegates engaged in an unmoderated session to identify sub-agendas.

Day 2: With a quorum of 55, the day began with GSL, followed by a 35-minute moderated session on the role of NSA in the region. Additional sessions covered legal loopholes and the role of technology in arms regulation. The day ended with an unmoderated session for documentation discussions.

Day 3: The final session focused on drafting solutions, followed by an unmoderated session to draft a resolution. However, no draft resolutions were ratified due to formatting errors, and the committee was adjourned.

Crisis Escalation:

Days 1 & 2: Rising tensions in Bengal saw accusations of betrayal, war crimes, and foreign interference. Jagath Seth was suspected of funding Mir Jafar's army, while fears of a Maratha invasion loomed. Delegates debated the legitimacy of alliances, Siraj ud-Daula's leadership, and the role of European forces, leading to calls for military action or diplomatic resolution.

Day 3: The final session focused on Siraj ud-Daula's failures, British and French war tactics, and Mir Jafar's potential rise to power. While no definitive solution emerged, discussions highlighted the complexity of power struggles leading up to the Battle of Plassey.

Continuous Crisis Management

Agenda: Regulation and Control of Semi-Automatic Weapons in the Middle East for Enhanced Regional Security

Day 1: The session began with a briefing on rules, followed by a roll call and General Speakers List (GSL). Debates centered on Bengal's political, military, and economic state before the Battle of Plassey, with key figures like Siraj ud-Daula, Robert Clive, Mir Jafar, and Jean Baptiste Rousseau presenting their views. Crisis updates, including an explosion at Mir Jafar's storage and a servant's mysterious death, intensified discussions. Unmoderated caucuses addressed shifting alliances and rising tensions.

Day 2: Discussions deepened on the British East India Company's role, allegations of poisoning, and Mir Jafar's betrayal. The legitimacy of Siraj ud-Daula's rule and the region's stability remained key points of debate, with delegates assessing military strategies and alliances amid growing unrest.

European Union Session

Days 1 & 2: The committee set the agenda to address the EU's refugee crisis. Debates covered policy implementation, anti-immigrant sentiments, refugee integration. **Delegates** proposed measures to tackle violence against refugees and improve mental health support in asylum procedures. Day 3: Formal documentation and voting took place, with multiple motions passed on refugee regulations policy frameworks. **Delegates** negotiated and finalized key directives before the session adjourned, concluding a productive debate on EU refugee policies.



Lok Sabha Session

Day 1: The session began with an introduction to procedures, followed by motions. Shri Narendra Modi initiated a moderated caucus on marital rape provisions, leading to a detailed discussion.

Day 2: Debates continued with a right to reply from Shri Arjun Ram Meghwal, resulting in Rahul Gandhi's temporary gag. A heated question hour followed, with members engaging in intense discussions.

Day 3: Members interrogated each other on policy matters before a fiery zero-hour debate on the Uniform Civil Code, led by Shri Rajnath Singh. Each session concluded with feedback from the DEBSOC secretariat.

UNHRC Session

Day 1: Delegates debated prison reforms under the Nelson Mandela Rules, addressing overcrowding, healthcare, and alternative sentencing.

Day 2: Discussions focused on discrimination against marginalized prisoners and legal gaps in human rights laws, with calls for clearer definitions and enforcement. Day 3: Emphasis was placed on standardized prison documentation for transparency, proposing global initiatives and blockchain technology to enhance accountability. The session concluded with recommendations rights for stronger prisoner protection.

UNSC Session

Day 1: The session began with a Rules of Procedure briefing, followed by an introduction to the Executive Board. A General Speakers' List (GSL) was initiated, with Pakistan opening and France concluding. China led a moderated caucus on Lebanon's political instability before adjournment.

Day 2: Discussions focused on UNIFIL's limitations and Lebanon's illegal arms trade, with moderated caucuses proposed by Jordan and Russia. Delegates analyzed security concerns and operational challenges.

Day 3: A Round Robin discussion allowed delegates to present solutions, followed by informal negotiations. After finalizing documentation, the session was formally adjourned.

International Press Corps (IPC)

At CUBSMUN 2025, the IPC played a vital role in capturing the conference through journalism and photography. Delegates reported on debates, negotiations, and resolutions, providing unbiased insights. The photography team documented key moments, while journalists conducted interviews with delegates and the Executive Board. Their efforts resulted in daily newsletters, enriching the conference experience and highlighting the significance of responsible journalism in global affairs.

NRITTA -2025










VACHANA 2025

Dr S Irudaya Rajan (IIMAD Chairman) delivered the keynote, "Development Displacement and Migrant Identity Crisis," highlighting the necessity for structured migration policies. The session on Responsible Gaming focused on the importance of mindful gaming habits, online safety, and ethical gameplay. The discussion covered the growth of the gaming industry, different types of online games (casual, esports, and betting), and the risks associated with impulsive gaming behavior.

The resource person also discussed safety precautions for online betting, the importance of cyber awareness, and how to report cyber fraud through cybercrime.gov.in. To engage students, the session featured an interactive "Never Have I Ever – Game Edition", allowing participants to reflect on their gaming experiences. The session concluded with practical tips on responsible gaming, including limiting pocket money for games, understanding gaming ethics, and maintaining digital safety. Overall, it highlighted the importance of communication, trust, and informed decisionmaking in the gaming world.

ANGEL INVESTING BY MR CHAND DAS

27 February 2025

The second guest lecture on New Venture Planning, by Mr. Chand Das, provided a deep dive into the intricacies of the startup ecosystem. The session began with an overview of the startup journey, outlining the primary and secondary stages, from bootstrapping to Key terms such IPO. as incubators. accelerators, angel investors, venture capital, and private equity were explained in detail. Mr. Das emphasized that reaching an IPO can take over a decade, and understanding the right stage to seek funding is crucial for startup success.





Drawing from his experience, Mr. Das shared case studies of two successful startups— Artison Agrotech and Virohan. He outlined their strategies for sharpening their value proposition by identifying core customer needs differentiating themselves and from competitors. The discussion covered key factors such as customer segmentation (B2C, B2B, B2G) and how businesses tailor their product offerings to maximize impact. He illustrated how Artison Agrotech helped farmers achieve threefold productivity gains through agronomy services and assured buyback models, while Virohan focused on AHP certifications, financial support, and placements for healthcare professionals.

The discussion then shifted to key players in the including incubators ecosystem, such NSRCEL, Villgro, and IIMCIP, which offer early-stage for ventures support mentorship, grants, and demo days. Accelerators, often sponsored by companies, provide more intensive short-term growth programs. The importance of angel investor networks like Keiretsu Forum and Lead Angels was highlighted, alongside the role of strategic investors and SME IPOs.
















UPSC ASPIRANTS' MEET

20 February 2025





The UPSC Aspirants' Meet, organized by the Department of International Studies, Political Science, and History, aimed to guide and inspire future civil servants by providing valuable insights from experienced professionals. The session covered crucial aspects of UPSC preparation, including exam structure, career prospects, and essential skills for success.

The event began with a welcome address by Raashi Agarwal from the organizing committee, who introduced the purpose of the session—helping students gain clarity on the Civil Services Examination (CSE) and effective preparation strategies. The Associate Dean then officially inaugurated the session.

Mr. C. Sridhar, General Manager of The Hindu Group, emphasized the significance of newspapers in UPSC preparation. He discussed how reading The Hindu enhances current affairs knowledge, analytical thinking, and comprehension skills, which are essential for both Prelims and Mains. He also highlighted the Hindu Civil Service Aspirants' Club as a valuable resource for aspirants.

Mr Samrat B, a faculty member from Shankar IAS Academy, provided an in-depth analysis of the UPSC exam structure, breaking it down into Prelims, Mains, Interviews, and Medical Examination. He explained eligibility criteria and age limits and recommended study materials, stressing the importance of NCERT textbooks and newspapers in building a strong foundation.

"DEMOCRACY AND ETHICS" WORKSHOP

21 February 2025



The workshop "Democracy and Ethics" was organised Sarkar Sreemoyee (Assistant Department of International Studies, Political Science History. BGR) and Dr. Venkatanarayanan Sethuraman (HOD, Department of International Relations, Political Science and History, BGR) to inculcate among participating students multifaceted understanding of democracy and the ethical dilemmas associated with it. The sessions were organised separately in the two campuses of CHRIST University, Bangalore. The pilot session was hosted in the Central Campus on the 10th day of February 2025 (coordinated by Dr. Malvika Menon, Assistant Professor Department of International Relations, Political Science and History, Central Campus. A subsequent session was organised in BGR Campus on the 21st of February 2025.

The workshop was divided into three sessions: Morning, Noon and Afternoon. The morning session was led by Dr. Venkatanarayanan Sethuraman, where students were engaged in flash card activity, facilitating a nuanced conversation on democracy and ethics.

The noon session was led by Dr. Mithilesh Kumar (Assistant Professor, Department of English and Cultural Studies, Central Campus), where students were engaged in a role-play activity focusing on migration-related problem-solving activities and the ethical limitations of it.

The afternoon session was led by Dr. Shalini (Assistant Professor Department B International Relations, Political Science and History, BGR), where students were engaged case-study-based simulation "Reimagining Democracy in West Asia: Redirecting Peace, Justice and Human Rights".



MULTILINGUAL E-DICTIONARY

WORKSHOP 21 February 2025

The event began with a formal inauguration by the emcee, Akshita Tiwari, and was conducted by Dr. Hilal Ahmad Dar from the Central Institute of Indian Languages, Mysuru. The session commenced with a discussion on the fundamental aspects of dictionaries—what they are, what they include, and their role in language documentation. Dr. Dar elaborated on the field of lexicography, the process of creating dictionaries, and various definitions associated with it. A significant portion of the session focused on the importance essential dictionaries instruments as in preserving languages.Dr. Dar introduced key components of lexicography, particularly the concept of lexemes, and explained how they form the building blocks of dictionaries.





He then demonstrated various digital tools that help in managing linguistic and cultural data. One such tool, Fieldworks Language Explorer (FLEx), was highlighted for its ability to assist linguists documenting, analyzing, publishing language data. During the hands-on session, students were guided through the process of creating dictionary entries using FLEx. They explored how the tool facilitates structuring linguistic data systematically. Another tool, Lexique Pro, was also introduced, providing additional resource. interactive nature of the workshop allowed actively students to engage applications, ask questions, and clarify doubts. The workshop was highly informative and practical. By integrating theoretical concepts with digital tools, students gained valuable exposure to the field of lexicography and digital language documentation.



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
